The song we sing at midnight to end one year and begin another is called *The Farewell Waltz*, most of us think of it as "Auld Lang Syne."

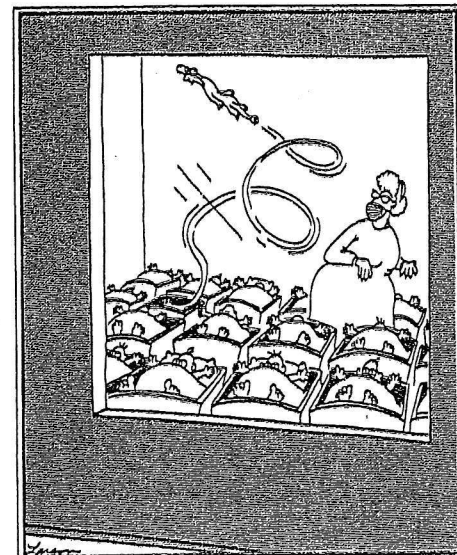
The shelter house on Saylor Road where we used to ice skate in the winter has been named "Ding Darling Shelter House."

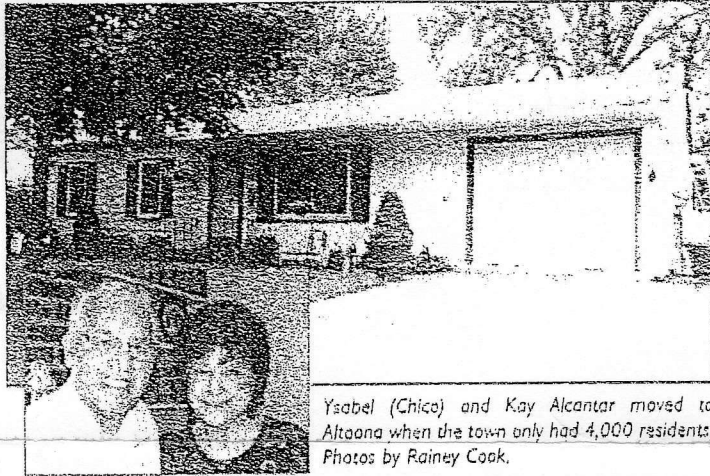
As Larry would say "gone but not forgotten".

Soon their annual summer picnic will be in full swing as all their children and grandchildren will gather to celebrate everyone

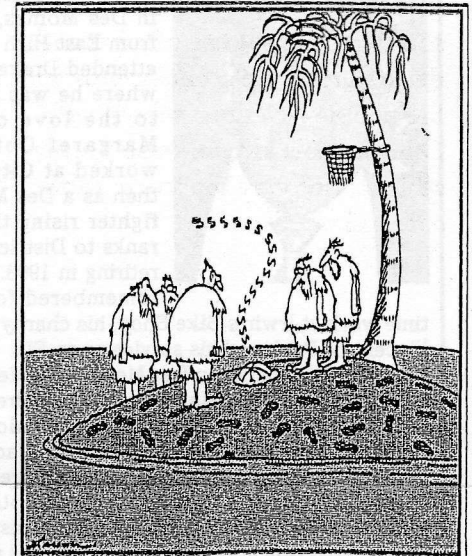

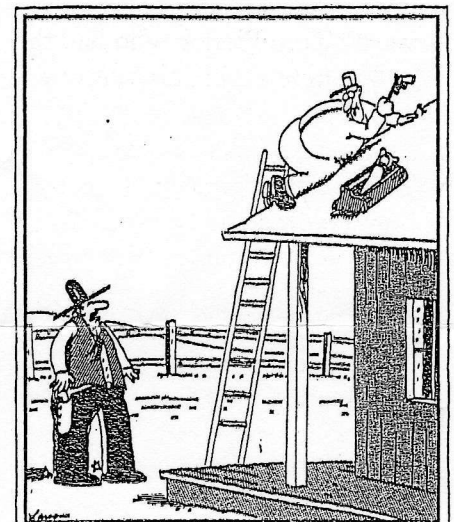
